REPORT FROM THE PRESIDENT

The Island Resources Foundation was launched in 1972, in part, with an institutional grant from the American Conservation Association and two unrestricted, corporate donations (one from American Airlines which has been a consistent supporter of the Foundation in the intervening years). Those of you who have monitored and supported our growth and development since those early years have shared with us some very "lean" times. Nevertheless, since 1972, we have carried out a rather diverse spectrum of projects in various island development sectors, in part, seeking effective routes to change and, in part, building a broadly based network of local cooperating contacts (individual and institutional) that have confidence in our commitments, capabilities and integrity. Our six year "track record" is noteworthy -- given the economic circumstances (the recession and our own limited funding) and the fact we started a full time program with no facilities, library, laboratory, endowment, or sustaining support -- only our own commitment to providing an insular and Caribbean community service function in educational, cultural, and environmental affairs.

Our annual funding flow has risen slowly, reaching approximately \$140,000 in 1977. Frankly, at this level, it has only been due to sustaining contributions from regular supporters and the dedication of senior and junior staff people -- who more often than not have been willing to work for partial salaries -- that we stand today as a viable and effective regional in-

stitution.

Now for some good news! At mid-point 1978, several indicators suggest that the Island Resources Foundation has taken some significant steps in the direction of stabilizing its institutional and fiscal structure. One very positive indication is the fact that our firm cash flow projection for the year to date already exceeds \$200,000.

Secondly, in response to our request for unrestricted institutional funding, the Rockefeller Brothers Fund (RBF) of New York has recently approved a three-year institutional development grant to the Foundation. The critical element in RBF support at this time (aside from a "pat on the back" from an important U.S. donor organization) is that RBF institutional development funding will enable the Foundation to more constructively influence the course of Caribbean island development activities, respond more effectively and promptly to small scale technical assistance requests, stabilize our professional staff, and make more effective use of our research associates and network of institutional contacts.

We are very grateful to the Rockefeller Brothers Fund for their endorsement and support, and wish to particularly thank Bill Moody of the RBF staff and Euan McFarlane, IRF Trustee from St. Croix, for their assistance and efforts on behalf of the Foundation.

Staff Changes ~ New Programs

THEODORE S. LEDBETTER, JR.

With the funding of a \$138,000 career education project by the US Office of Education, we are pleased to welcome to the IRF staff family Mr. Ted Ledbetter, most recently of Washington, D.C. and a former resident of the Virgin Islands.

Mr. Ledbetter will serve as project director of the Foundation's new career education project entitled "Discovering You". This career guidance program for Virgin Islands junior high students will focus on the development of 12 television programs, each of which will cover a broad occupational field.

Given the Virgin Islands high unemployment rate and documented unrest among island young people, "Discovering You" provides a framework to reach a very significant segment of the population through the application of mass media. The crucial interfacing of the media component with local community participation also creates a cross-generational dialogue in which older and established Virgin Islanders have an opportunity to share their experiences and insights with younger people in need of this guidance. The application of mass media techniques can serve as a catalyst in crystallizing the "people potential" of our islands and in providing a forum for an issue that is of central concern not only to Virgin Islanders, but to all West Indian peoples.

Mr. Ledbetter is uniquely qualified to head this important new program. A media and communications specialist, he has -- among other activities -- served as an editor and publisher of Black Communicator and The Wired City, was formerly affiliated with the US National Urban Coalition, has been president and general manager of the commercial television station in the Virgin Islands, and can perhaps best be remembered in the V.I. for his outstanding television documentary "Trouble at Truman".

RESEARCH ASSOCIATE: DR. MARVA BROWNE

IRF Research Associate, Dr. Marva S. Browne, a Virgin Islands nutritionist with a special interest in Caribbean nutrition education and outreach programs, has just been awarded a National Science Foundation Public Service Science Residency Grant in the amount of \$22,000. The Foundation will serve as the host organization for the one-year grant. Since 1977, Dr. Browne has worked with IRF to develop programs which focus on nutrition education and on nutrition policy planning. During the period of her NSF grant, Dr. Browne will continue these activities, and we shall be reporting on them in more detail in subsequent issues of the "Bulletin".

NEW PROJECT IN DOMINICA, WEST INDIES

Following up on previous IRF involvement with the Dominica National Park development project, the Foundation has been contracted by the Canadian Nature Federation (which has a grant from the Canadian International Development Agency) to carry out a series of specific planning activities relating to a long range park research program, development of research guidelines, historic site planning for the Caribits area, and liaison with appropriate international and regional funding and technical assistance agencies.

JIM AND MARY ANNE OLSEN

The Olsens, co-project directors of the Foundation's ethnic heritage educational program, will be leaving the Foundation for Barbados, where Jim has accepted a one year appointment with the Organization of American States, to work with Erdiston College.

As they depart, we wish to thank the Olsens for their contributions to IRF, and to particularly acknowledge Jim's contribution in the development of the career education project, described earlier in this section of the "Bulletin".

**BOARD OF TRUSTEES ACKNOWLEDGES SUPPORT OF HAROLD COOLIDGE
HOLDS ANNUAL MEETING IN WASHINGTON, D.C.**

At the Annual Meeting of the Board of Trustees (held at the home of Trustee John D. Archbold in Washington, D.C. in late February), it was with deep regret that the President of the Foundation announced the resignation of Dr. Harold J. Coolidge, Vice Chairman of the Board.

A Trustee of the Foundation since 1972, Dr. Coolidge's career spans a half century of involvement with conservation organizations throughout the world. On behalf of the Board, the President conveyed to Dr. Coolidge its very deep appreciation for his many services over the years, and further expressed his personal gratitude for Dr. Coolidge's support and encouragement. His wise counsel will be missed, but he shall remain a friend of the Foundation as the Board voted that an honorary life membership be extended to Dr. Coolidge in recognition of his good work on behalf of IRF.

Also, at the Trustee's annual meeting, it was announced that the Foundation's at-

torney and Secretary of the Board, Mr. Clarence McLaughlin, had submitted his resignation, due to the fact that he is retiring and will no longer be domiciled in the Virgin Islands. Affiliated with the Foundation since its inception and having seen the organization through the laborious process of obtaining tax exempt status, Mr. McLaughlin has also been a faithful supporter of IRF and, like Dr. Coolidge, will be missed on the Board.

Following the annual election of officers, it was determined that the post of Chairman of the Board will remain vacant during the coming year, while John Archbold will serve as Vice Chairman. Attorney Charles Consolvo of St. Thomas has agreed to serve as the Foundation's attorney (at a retainer fee of \$1.00 per year!) and will occupy the post of Foundation Secretary. Judith A. Towle was elected Treasurer for the 1978-1979 fiscal year.

Ongoing Projects --

History & Culture

*V.I. HISTORICAL HERITAGE.

Working from the premise that the U.S. Virgin Islands is a unique American territorial possession and that its historical experience has been not only characteristically Caribbean in nature, but constitutes a special kind of Afro-American community within the American experience, the Island Resources Foundation has continued to support development of a Virgin Islands Historical Records Program and to work with government agencies and other groups in support of that effort.

Specifically, under the leadership of our Director of History and Culture, George F. Tyson, Jr., the Foundation has moved ahead in the development of a plan to carry out records surveys and to prepare finding aids for the pre-1917 Virgin Islands state records deposited in the national repositories of the United States, Denmark, Great Britain, Holland, France and Spain. A proposal, which builds on Mr. Tyson's earlier planning study, has been prepared and submitted to the U.S. National Endowment for the Humanities to complete this work.

*CARIBBEAN ARCHITECTURE. As the response to our unpublished (1977) report on historic site preservation has been greater than our ability to fulfill requests, the Foundation has published a revised version of the earlier report, including graphics (17 photos, line drawings, map) and an expanded bibliography. The printed booklet, entitled Caribbean Historic Site Preservation: A Status Report, was released in February and can be purchased for \$4.50/copy, including postage.

Education

*CARIBBEAN HERITAGE STUDIES.

The Foundation's pilot educational program in ethnic heritage studies (funded by the U.S. Office of Edu-

cation) reached its final development phase with recent implementation of a series of teacher training workshops for over 100 teachers in the Virgin Islands. The in-service training sessions focused on use of the instructional materials developed under the OE-funded program (called "Caribbean Roots") and provided each participant with one set of 36 student activity stencils and a teacher's guide. The supplemental instructional program includes activities in language arts, history, crafts, folk arts, geography, biography, food preparation, all with a multi-cultural Caribbean theme.

Materials were enthusiastically received by workshop participants, and an editorial in a local Virgin Islands newspaper lauded the program by stating that it "could be one method in transforming today's largely dysfunctional education system into one that will ... capture the interest of students and help them realize the importance of education to their lives."

*EXPERIENTIAL EDUCATION AND CULTURAL JOURNALISM. All-Ah-Wee Magazine: "... written and produced in the U.S. Virgin Islands by young people who love them..." The final issue of the All-Ah-Wee Magazine, the Virgin Islands' version of the popular Foxfire educational concept, was released for distribution in the spring. With the partial support of a small grant from the V.I. Council on the Arts, the Foundation assisted in the publication of the final issue of All-Ah-Wee, which, unfortunately, because of lack of on-going institutional support from V.I. public schools, will come to an end with this last effort. Copies are available at no charge from IRF.

Resource Planning

*V.I. RECREATIONAL/COMMERCIAL FISHING AND BOATING SURVEY. Sixteen hundred Virgin Islands boat owners

have now received copies of the Foundation's questionnaire soliciting information about the use of V.I. waters by both commercial and recreational fishermen and boat owners. Responses will help Foundation staff in developing guidelines for better management of those marine resources which are vital to both recreational and commercial boating and fishing interests.

If you use the waters surrounding the Virgin Islands and have not received a questionnaire, please contact us for a copy.

***BRITISH VIRGIN ISLANDS MARINE PARK DEVELOPMENT.** In conjunction with a) the IUCN Caribbean marine habitats mapping project (headed by Dr. G. Carleton Ray of The Johns Hopkins University), b) the Rockefeller Brothers Fund sponsored "Eastern Caribbean Natural Areas Program" (headed by Mr. Allen Putney of St. Croix) and c) the Town Planner's Office of the British Virgin Islands Government (headed by Mr. Ivor Jackson), the Foundation is currently engaged in a site survey, planning and technical assistance effort aimed at developing a system of marine parks and preserves in the B.V.I.

***ANGUILLA MARINE RESOURCES.** An effort similar to that in the B.V.I., but including also the development of a marine resources (especially fisheries) preliminary management plan, is being undertaken by IRF in Anguilla, at the request of the Ministry of Natural Resources and Tourism.

FOUNDATION ANNOUNCES ESTABLISHMENT OF SUPPORT OFFICES

By mid-summer, branch offices of the Island Resources Foundation will be operational in Washington, D.C. (eastern U.S. office), Vancouver, British Columbia (Canadian office), and Georgetown, Guyana (southern Caribbean office).

Our Washington office, formerly maintained at the headquarters of IDEAS, Inc., was relocated when IDEAS moved their facility to Reston, Virginia. Now located at 1718 P St. NW, #518, the IRF office serves as an operational base for Foundation staff during working trips to the eastern U.S. Telephone number at the Washington facility is (202) 265-9712.

The new Vancouver office will be maintained by IRF Research Associate John McEachern, a resource geographer who was formerly in residence at IRF headquarters in St. Thomas (1972-74) and who is co-author, with E. Towle, of the book Ecological Guidelines for Island Development (published in 1974 by IUCN). Mr. McEachern will maintain contact with Canadian international funding agencies, on behalf of Foundation program development. The office is located at 6107 Galbraith Crescent, Ladner, British Columbia (just outside of Vancouver). In the southern Caribbean, our new office will be under the direction of Mr. Mahamad Hanif in Georgetown, Guyana. A wildlife specialist and environmental planner, Mr. Hanif was formerly associated with the Foundation from 1972-74, at which time he served as Executive Director of the Caribbean Conservation Association (then located at IRF). NEW YORK -- where Dr. Edward Towle and Mr. James Olsen, President and former Director of Educational Programs, respectively, were guest speakers at a session on Alternative Development Strategies at the SOCIETY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT held at the United Nations in March. (Arrangements for this meeting were made for the Foundation by Mr. Jonathan Blum, IRF Research Associate and a Foundation representative to the United Nations NGO section.)

Later in that same week, Dr. Towle led a staff seminar at the UN CENTRE FOR HOUSING, BUILDING AND PLANNING on "Island Environments and Development".

PUERTO RICO -- where the Foundation's President was a featured speaker at the FIRST CARIBBEAN CONFERENCE ON ENERGY FOR DEVELOPMENT. Ever controversial, Dr. Towle's remarks were the source of front page headlines in the San Juan Star the following day!

ANTIGUA -- where Edward and Judith Towle, at the invitation of the FRIENDS OF ENGLISH HARBOUR, met with island civic leaders and government officials, including Premier Vere Bird, to discuss development issues ranging from historic preservation to land use controls to a proposed maritime training school. Dr. Towle was guest speaker on a weekly television program sponsored by the ANTIGUA HISTORIC SITES COMMISSION.

1978 OVERVIEW

As this calendar year draws to a close, we are pleased to report to our members, patrons, and friends that the Island Resources Foundation has completed its most successful year in the institution's six year history. Gifts, grants, donations, and public sector contract monies for 1978 will exceed \$225,000. In part, this has been due to an increased level of project activity, and, in part, we have achieved a more solid base of unrestricted, institutional support funding -- notably from the Rockefeller Brothers Fund, as reported in our Mid-Year "Bulletin", while old friends (particularly American Airlines and Nancy Spire) have continued to lend financial assistance.

NEW PROJECTS...

Community-Based Environmental Education

With receipt of a \$54,000 grant from the U.S. Office of Education, the Foundation launched, in October, a 12 month environmental project aimed at providing assistance to Virgin Islands non-profit, public service organizations in the development of action programs in critical areas of

environmental concern. The project is non-partisan and non-political, emphasizing an outreach effort to grassroots community groups to assist them in exercising a more active, more informed, and more responsible role in the local planning and decision making process. Project staff members include Ed and Judith Towle, George Tyson, David and Susan Olsen, Arthur Watres and Doug Lee. The project will be carried out in cooperation with the V.I. Conservation Society.

Program Planning Strategy For The Caribbean Environment

Under a grant from the U.S. National Commission for UNESCO, supplemented by funds from the Rockefeller Brothers Fund, the Foundation is implementing a Caribbean-wide survey of current and projected environmental research, technical assistance and educational programs. The survey will develop a

strategy for project evaluation, selection and funding appropriate to the objectives of the U.S. National Commission for UNESCO and, in particular, of its MAB-7B (Man and the Biosphere) program on island areas. Foundation president, Ed Towle, will direct this effort, assisted by marine biologist, Dr. David Olsen, and IRF research associate, Mr. Mahamad Hanif of Guyana.

Protection Of Wildlife

As a part of a national effort by the National Marine Fisheries Service to develop comprehensive programs to prevent the extinction of sea turtles, and building on earlier Foundation efforts to implement West Indian wildlife research and species management programs, IRF recently completed a survey and status report on leatherback, green and hawksbill sea turtle nesting in the U.S. Virgin Islands

Continuing Projects...

Career Education

To implement its career education project (funded by the U.S. Office of Career Education in July), the Founda-


tion has recently acquired full video filming and production capability. With the purchase of a camera and video editing system, the Foundation now has the means to produce in-house the 12 television programs for our forthcoming career education series. Ted Ledbetter, project director, has commenced full-time production and anticipates broadcasting of the first shows on Virgin Islands public television in February of next year.

Technical Assistance:

BVI and
Anguilla

Foundation staff have continued to work with the Government of the British Virgin Islands (in cooperation with the Eastern Caribbean Natural Areas Program) in planning and developing a system of marine parks and preserves for the B.V.I. Ancillary to this work, Dr. David Olsen, Director of Marine Resources Development at IRF, presented a timely paper on the subject of "British Virgin Islands Coastal Waters -- Use and Conservation" at the Annual General Meeting of the Caribbean Conservation Association held in Tortola in September.

In November, Foundation president, Ed Towle, met again with officials of the Government of Anguilla to work together in designing a comprehensive marine parks survey and implementation plan for this British island rich in marine resources. The International Union for the Conservation of Nature has asked the Foundation to develop a proposal in cooperation with the Anguillan Government, and it is anticipated funds will be forthcoming from several international funding agencies.

Assistance To Dominica Park

The Foundation is currently working with the Canadian Nature Federation in support of the further development of the Morne Trois Piton National Park in Dominica. Staff members are developing a draft research plan for the Park, reviewing development options for the Cabrit area (an historic site), will be developing interpretive documents for popular use, and are exploring sources of funding and technical assistance support. Dr. Towle and George Tyson, Director of History and Culture Programs at IRF, met with Park and Government officials in Dominica in early December, and will soon be submitting their final recommendations to Government and to the Canadian Nature Federation, which has lent support to the Park since its inception.

Nutrition Education and Outreach

IRF Nutritionist, Dr. Marva S. Browne, under a National Science Foundation Public Service Residency, has concentrated recent efforts on the development of a nutritional assessment and surveillance program for Virgin Islands children. Meetings have been held with territorial government officials to coordinate liaison with appropriate agencies, and a comprehensive program proposal is being prepared for submission to the Maternal and Child Health ... Services office of DHEW. Dr. Browne has also inaugurated a biweekly radio program on nutrition and a regular newspaper column ("The Catta Column") which appears twice monthly in local Virgin Islands newspapers.

INTER-AMERICAN - CARIBBEAN:

Workshop - Museums & Historic sites

IRF was represented at the October workshop (held in Kingston, Jamaica) by George F. Tyson, director of history and culture programs. Sponsored by CARICOM (the Caribbean Community Secretariat), the workshop was designed to provide a forum for the advancement of regional cultural cooperation in the area of museums and historic preservation, as well as to provide an opportunity for a review of current programs and activities, principally in the English-speaking states and territories of the Caribbean.

As a follow-up to the regional meeting, and as a reaffirmation of the Foundation's institutional commitment to the premise that active assistance to regional historical and cultural programs is urgently needed and constitutes a credible and viable mechanism for encouraging a well rounded and cooperative pattern of regional development, Mr. Tyson has met with appropriate officials and individuals in Antigua, Dominica, and St. Kitts to lend assistance and to further program development activities in the areas of archival development, cultural park planning, and historic site/museum programming.

Fisheries

Dr. David Olsen of IRF recently presented a paper dealing with current Caribbean fisheries research at the Thirty-First Annual Gulf and Caribbean Fisheries Institute held in Cancun, Mexico. From Mexico, Dr. Olsen traveled to Panama to meet with U.S./AID, UNDP, and Panamanian government officials concerning a proposed fisheries development and nutritional enhancement project for the San Blas Islands in Panama. Dr. Olsen spent six months there last year and has developed a prototypic project design which has received local endorsement in the San Blas Islands.
